



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What Is Printmaking?

Printmaking is an artistic process based on the principle of transferring images from a matrix onto another surface, most often paper or fabric. Traditional printmaking techniques include woodcut, etching, engraving, and lithography, while modern artists have expanded available techniques to include screen printing. (MET Museum)

Distinctive landforms like the Outback and the Great Barrier Reef.





Australia: Cressida Campbell


Campbell, in her study with her work

Born in Sydney, Australia (East Coast), 1960

Studied at East Sydney Technical College & Yoshida Hanga Academy in Tokyo

Member of the *Know My Name*, gallery campaign, “celebrates the work of all women artists...” (NGA)

Her work for the last several decades highlights the “overlooked beauty of the everyday

Technique ~ she carves and paints on woodblock and then uses rollers to imprint – this process takes her months to complete

She is considered one of Australia's most significant contemporary artists.




Icelandic Sky, Original monoprint, inspired by adventures in Iceland and the magnificent light. Printed using textured elements. Trimmed to plate size.

"A printmaker whose practice centres on an emotional response to landscape rather than any form of literal representation. Drawn to the isolated, dramatic and other worldly landscape of Iceland, Grace's prints encapsulate contrasting earthly forms and expansive skies".




Expansive Sky, monotype, 2022, 16 x 22cm (right)

Alaska: Amber Webb

Webb's qaspeq (right) is over 10 feet tall, and its creation has been a very personal project for the Yup'ik artist. Webb illustrated each woman using Sharpie pens, taking an average of three hours to draw each one. The artwork brings light to the violent toll brought upon indigenous women.

“According to the Urban Indian Health Institute, over 5,700 Alaska Native and Native American women and girls were reported missing as of 2016, but the U.S. Department of Justice only documented 116 of those cases.

Initially, Webb wanted to illustrate 396 portraits on the qaspeq, but as time went on, the project changed. By fall 2019, Webb had drawn nearly 200” Rasmuson Foundation

Yup'ik Indigenous Artist

Currently lives in Anchorage

Activist for Missing & Murdered Indigenous Women

Her work focuses on visual storytelling to address issues such as colonization, intergenerational trauma, and resilience within Indigenous communities.



